in the U.S. is a NIDA funded GO study being conducted at nine STD clinics across the country. Collaborating with Drs. Metsch and Colfax are teams from four of the CTN 0032 sites and Nodes, and additional new locations, each based in STD clinics in the U.S. The team is proud to report that their participating sites have randomized 3,016 participants as of Tuesday, August 24, 2010. This milestone brings the study to 60% of the ultimate goal of 5,000 randomized participants. The site teams have worked tirelessly to achieve these goals. CTN 0046 S-CAST Wave 2 Sites Come on Board

The first two Wave 2 sites have been endorsed to begin the CTN 0046 study *Smoking-Cessation and Stimulant Treatment (S-CAST):*

Evaluation of the Impact of Concurrent Outpatient Smoking-Cessation and Stimulant Treatment on Stimulant-Dependence. The sites, Behavioral Health Services of Pickens County and LRADAC, are both in the Southern Consortium Node. Recruitment is already in full swing at both sites.

The remaining four sites have completed their initiation visits and are working to resolve all outstanding issues. Gibson Recovery Center (Ohio Valley Node), Tarzana and Matrix (Pacific Node), and Nexus Recovery (Texas Node) are looking forward to endorsing within the next few weeks. Dr. Theresa Winhusen and her team at the Lead Node wish to thank everyone involved in the Wave 2 pre-initiation process for their hard work and flexibility!

The Pacific Region Node was pleased to host a CTN Dissemination Conference August 9-11, 2010, in Marina Del Rey, California. The Dissemination Conference was held concurrently with the UCLA CALDAR Summer Institute on longitudinal research.

The conference was attended by approximately 150 investigators and community treatment program staff as well as representatives from the National Institute on Drug Abuse.

Day One speakers included Dr. Tom McLellan from the Office of National Drug Control Policy, Dr. Wesley Clark from the Center for Substance Abuse Treatment, and Dr. Wilson Compton of NIDA. Days Two and Three offered specific presentations which included Dr. Walter Ling addressing chronic pain in opioid dependent individuals, Dr. Deni Carise who spoke about the future of addiction treatment using evidence-based practices, Dr. Richard Rawson on current models of recovery support services, Dr. Andy Saxon who spoke about co-occurring disorders with an emphasis on post traumatic stress, and Dr. Steve Shoptaw who discussed behavioral methamphetamine abuse treatment and HIV transmission risk reduction. Update from Appalachian Tri-State Node (ATS)



The Appalachian Tri-State Node has been involved in CTN dissemination and teaching this summer. Teaching on Evidenced-Based Practices (EBPs) by

Node faculty and staff included:

- a. Stu Baker (trainer on CTN 0031- Twelve Step Facilitation) provided a 2-day workshop on Twelve Step Facilitation; 55 CTP clinicians attended.
- b. Drs. Thomas Kelly & Antoine Douaihy from their Node and CTP provided two 2-day training programs on MI (Motivational Interviewing): (1) one for pain physicians & fellows on MI; a follow-up survey of 10 physicians showed a good degree of acceptance and moderate degree of using MI strategies in work with pain patients; (2) one for behavioral health care clinicians in Pittsburgh.
- c. Dr. Rolly Sullivan from their WVA CTP and PI Dr. Dennis Daley provided a morning research educational program on the CTN and clinical research in behavioral health care at the annual Faculty and Residents retreat for WVU School of Medicine.
- d. Dr. Dennis Daley provided lectures on EBPs at a conference in Hilo, Hawaii, a conference for social workers in Pittsburgh, and at the VA Homeless program in Pittsburgh.
- e. ATS Node faculty provided a series of 4 lectures on the etiology of addiction and EBPs to faculty, residents and clinical staff as part of a new educational series.

Their West Virginia CTP, Chestnut Ridge Center in Morgantown, West Virginia, conducted the "West Virginia Addiction Training Institute," a 5-day program covering a variety of evidence-based practices for addiction. This was developed and directed by Mimmie Byrne, LCSW and Rolly Sullivan, MD, both members of the ATS Node. Several others from this CTP presented as well. Nearly 100 clinicians attended this training.
