The Alcohol and Drug Abuse Institute is a multidisciplinary research center at the University of Washington. Its mission is to support and facilitate research and research dissemination in the field of alcohol and drug abuse.



The ADAI Library is a resource for UW students, faculty and staff, as well as for substance abuse professionals and university students in Washington.

The library collection covers the spectrum of research and scientific literature on alcohol and other drug use from all relevant disciplines, including medicine, nursing, social work, psychology, sociology, and criminal justice.

## Library Collection

- 4,000+ books and monographs
- 100 core journals and newsletters
- 200+ videos
- 800+ clinical and research questionnaires
- Statistical and other reference sources
- 90,000+ articles, reprints, pamphlets, and unpublished documents

## On-line Resources

**Library Catalog:** The Library produces an on-line catalog with over 95,000 articles, books and reprints which can be search by author, keywords in title, source, date and other criteria.

**Video Catalog:** Web-searchable catalog contains our collection of over 200 videos.

**Other Databases:** Library staff can search dozens of bibliographic databases covering substance abuse and related disciplines. Bibliographies and some journals are available on-line.

Two workstations in the Library provide Internet access to the UW Library catalog and other on-line resources.


